Message from the Manse

A few weeks ago, I was invited to speak to the Wesley Guild at Rayleigh, reflecting on the youth work that I have been and continue to do. It made me realise that I've been doing it for quite some time now, 30 years ago I became a BB Officer at one church, and I was also running a church youth group at our own church with Caroline.

While we were at conference in 2015, I walked towards Jessica, who was talking to Megan the then Youth President, and I heard her say, "My dad will help at 3Generate", and she turned to me and said "won't you dad?" so I did.

I think I have probably told you about the amazing experience I had working at 3Generate 2015, and seeing all our amazing young people in the Methodist Church, all 600 of them. This year there will be 800 young people, with 11 going from Hockley and one leader (Merle Kebbell), and Caroline Warrey and Pat Norman from Rayleigh. This year they have me running the stewarding team. So pray for us all over the weekend of 23rd-25th November, as we and 800 young people from the Methodist Church have a great time, thinking about the future of our church.

A few weekends ago we had Tim Annan, the Methodist Youth President visiting our circuit and staying with us in the manse. This is the second visit we have hosted for a Youth President. On Friday evening, he visited the new Fusion children's group at Benfleet. Saturday lunch was at Highlands who were celebrating their 90th Anniversary. He even got interviewed by Peter Holmes from BBC Radio Essex. Following a quick tour of the highlights of Southend he joined the young people at Hockley Methodists for an evening of music, puppets, conversation and Pizza. Sunday morning he joined me at Trinity where we were able to tell the congregation, the children and their children & youth workers about 3Generate and try to encourage them to send some children next year. I do hope Rayleigh can send some children next year. Sunday afternoon was the main event at the Megacentre in Rayleigh, and Tim led a session for our young people, between fun and laser games on challenging them planning their own activities. It was great to spend the weekend with Tim, and we are very fortunate to have him as our youth president.

One of the things I have been reflecting on recently is what my dream church would be like, and it's not all about the youth! My dream church would have all ages in it. From the babies in the crèche to the great, great, great grandmothers. I love our big events, parties and messy church, big services when we are all

together. I love it when the young people take responsibility for things, and I love it when our older people help them. I still have a fond memory from Rayleigh of our 97 year old Joan sitting on the same table as the toddlers and enjoying the colouring in. One church family all working together – my dream of a church.

Paul writes in Ephesians 5:1-2: Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children, and live in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.

Let's keep working on becoming this big church family all working together. Our church families are many and varied, from mums and toddlers to pre-schools, a community church, scouts and guiding; we just need to find the best ways and the best times to connect and have fun and learn together, work together and worship together. To do this let us imitate God, let us love and let us forgive, let us sacrifice our lives for a better life, a life as a child of God, a life as one of his kingdom builders, a kingdom builder.

As one of these kingdom builders in the Methodist church let us try and follow John Wesley's advice:

"Do all the good you can. By all the means you can. In all the ways you can. In all the places you can. At all the times you can. To all the people you can. As long as ever you can."

We have been asked if we can provide teams to cook and a team to look after the residents on the following dates:

17th December, 21st January, 18th February, 18th March.

Please can you let Gail know on <u>admin@rayleighmethodistchurch.org.uk</u> if you may be available to be part of our teams on those nights. We will need to know as soon as possible, especially if we think we may not be able to fulfil our responsibility. I am also circulating this to Rochford folks

We need:-

Cook Team - around 4 people to prepare and service a meal to 20-25 people, prepare drinks, and wash up etc. Cost of the food materials will be re-imbursed from the Night Shelter account. Cook Team would be needed say 6pm to 10pm.

Hosting/Sleeping -3 people to stay overnight, at least one male to ensure the safety of the guests. Hosting teams need to be present till 7:30am in the morning. (Camp beds are provided, and you should get some sleep during the night). There is training available.

The Night Shelter is being hosted again at United Methodist Church, Whittingham Avenue.

Again we are being asked to provide Towels on our evening, and this year also to bring the "spare clothes".

I am planning on being there for each of these evenings as the "Chaplain".

Thursday Social Club

On Thursday 22nd September we made the short trip to the Rayleigh Town Museum which is located in the High Street next to the Pizza House and in the far corner. We were met at 7 o' clock by local historian Mike Davis who showed us the way to the access lift. There is a limit on the number of people using the access lift so we entered 2 by 2, in other words four at a time. The lift took us to rooms above the Pizza House and had much more space than we first realised.

It was a real Aladdin's cave as there was so much to see and well worth a visit. There were pictures of old Rayleigh and many old maps revealing a complete different Rayleigh to the one we know today. Mike Davis was a very good speaker and most knowledgeable on the local area. We watched a short film on life as it was many decades ago. Local school children visit the museum on a regular basis and seem quite excited in discovering old Rayleigh. After the film we wandered around the museum looking at old photos, postcards, cinema programmes and of particular interest was an old cine projector which would have been used for Saturday morning pictures. It reminded me of when I used to go with my brother and friends to the ABC Carlton in West Ham costing us a tanner each. That's sixpence in old money for all you youngsters. Mrs Davis provided tea and cakes for our party and we all promised to visit again.

Chartered Physic Orthopaedics, Steve and Faye Oakley welcomed our club members to their new clinic on Thursday 6th October at the corner of Rochford Square.

Steve and Faye opened up their new clinic in midsummer but also work at the Wellesley Hospital and Southend Hospital. The talk was given by Steve, assisted by his wife Faye and titled "Vestibular Rehabilitation. This sounds complicated I hear you say. The reason I can hear you say that is because I do not have an acute problem in this area. Vestibular Rehabilitation is all about the ear and balance, and related ear ailments. If you have a hearing problem this is the clinic you need to visit as you might enter the clinic with labyrinthitus or an ear infection but leave as a new man or woman if that takes your fancy.

One exercise that Steve used was to make the patient roll their head moving the infection into other internal channels. Although hard to believe this system does work. The only drawback to this is that the patient leaves with their neck in a brace to prevent the infection re- entering the infected area. Other words used were "benign", "paroxysmal", "positional" and "vertigo" but due to no dictionary to hand I cannot give you an explicit meaning to these words. Teas and coffees were served from their catering area as Steve and Faye invited questions from the floor. Steve answered the questions and explained how these could be treated. Hopefully these answers were heard by the questioner. We came away from the clinic must more informed on the subject "Vestibular Rehabilitation."

A separate folio of colour slides was introduced in 1956 and later on there were further developments into colour prints, digital pictures and an art folio.

The Club currently has about 100 members and a number of different groups, although rather sadly the digital age has seen the end of slides - the group to which we first belonged, having been talked into joining by Rev Sam Connolly when he paid a return visit to Hockley. Indeed we used to look forward to the monthly arrival of a box of 20 or so slides and read the comments of the other members - even if we didn't always agree with them.
