On the Home Front World War II

My earliest memory is that of the bomb. Not the bang, I don't remember that, but of being thrown by my mother into our Anderson shelter and landing on top of my sister who my mother had thrown down the steps a split second before. My older sister was screaming and my mother was telling us to sing and I couldn't make out what the problem was, why was my sister crying? Why was my mother telling us to sing?

What I don't remember was that earlier in the day my mother had taken us into town shopping and on the way there we met the lady from next door but one with her little girl. The little girl was highly excited and showed us her new pair of bright red shoes and told us that when she got home she was going to put them on and dance and dance and dance.

Then came the afternoon, we were in the garden and my mother was taking the washing from the line when 'Tugboat Annie' sounded. 'Tugboat Annie' was the imminent warning that sounded just like a ship's hooter and followed the usual air raid siren, but that day there'd been no time for sirens to tell us something bad was on the way. Dad ran next door to make sure that the old lady who lived there was safe just as a dive bomber started his attack. Mum picked my sister and me up and threw us into the Anderson just as the bomb went off.

My dad was really lucky, as he was going into next door the bomb exploded and the only injury he had was a bump on the head when his head smacked into the door, my mum said later that she didn't expect to see him alive again. The old lady was uninjured but only next door to them, the little girl along with her mother and seven other people died.

I often think of that little girl and she is always the first person that comes to mind on Remembrance Day. She'd have probably been a grandmother by now but I like to imagine her in her own little patch of heaven wearing those bright red shoes and dancing, dancing, dancing.

Thursday Social Club

On Wednesday 2nd August 2017 our group paid a visit to Writtle Agricultural College near Chelmsford. Our first port of call however was the nearby Lordship Tea Rooms which is part of the Wilkins Tea Rooms group. This is just across the road from the college and a perfect place to stop for tea and cakes.



On arrival at the tea rooms it was comparatively quiet but

within a short time it soon began to fill. Despite being busy we were soon served by the courteous staff and were enjoying the pleasant atmosphere. With the time ticking on we left The Lordship Tea Rooms for the short drive to Writtle Agricultural College.

We parked at the entrance to the college and were met by our guide. After a preliminary introduction we were then shown around the extensive grounds where students had been put to work digging the plots and planting hundreds of plants. Japanese knotweed had been a persistent problem and the words that kept returning were "double digging". This apparently is the only way to resolve the problem. The students' quarters were pointed out and from the description it seemed more like a top class hotel. As we walked round the grounds the sky above us became darker by the minute. With perfect timing our guided walk came to an end as the first spots of rain began to fall. If you want to know about plants make sure you book a visit now. Lovely natural surroundings and a most informative guide.

A completely different venue for our second summer outing on Wednesday 23rd August 2017 as we visited the Stow Maries Aerodrome near Maldon. In World War 1 this aerodrome was paramount in protecting our region in the face of provocation from German forces.

Arriving at the aerodrome we met up in the car park before the short walk to the reception area to be greeted by their volunteer staff. Our guides introduced themselves as we were shown the way to the Airmen's Mess where our tables had been prepared for us. The staff took our orders and within minutes had brought us our teas and coffees supplemented by plates of biscuits placed on our tables. Models of World War 1 planes were suspended from the ceiling helping to recreate an atmosphere of yesteryear.

A full programme had been arranged and we were then introduced to Russell Savory who was to give us a talk on the wildlife in the area. You may know Russell from his many appearances on TV's Springwatch and Autumnwatch programmes. We were due to be taken around their conservation area by Russell but he had recently had a

knee operation and was confined to a wheelchair. A screen had been set up in an adjoining room and on finishing our teas and coffees we joined Russell for his film show. Owls are prevalent in this area and films of barn owls, tawny owls, and snowy owls entertained us. An amusing film of weasels playing was one of my favourites closely followed by films of rabbits chasing around the aerodrome. The films completed we had time to spare before our pre booked lunch.

This gave us the opportunity to explore the well stocked gift shop and the museum next door. Stow Maries was an important aerodrome in the defence of Britain and many of the young airmen were local lads.

Time for lunch and we made our way back to the Airmen's Mess. On entering we were impressed by the presentation of our reserved tables. Our pre booked orders of cottage pie, salmon or jacket potatoes with various fillings were soon brought in to us. We were spoilt by the offering before us. We somehow had to find room for our desserts of either profiteroles or apple crumble and custard. I must recommend the apple crumble and custard which you would find hard to beat. Teas and coffees followed adding to our culinary pleasure. Before we were able to leave our tables an unexpected gift of After Eights were placed on our table.

Our aerodrome guide arrived and we joined him for a walk around the hangars which displayed many features of interest. It is hard to believe that one hundred years ago many airmen died protecting our country and many of these airmen did not see their twentieth birthday. The final hangar visited contained reproductions of Sopwith Camels, Sopwith Pups and many more World War One planes. The expertise shown by the volunteers was phenomenal.

If you ever get the chance to visit this historic site you must go. We completed our visit by purchasing souvenirs from the well stocked gift shop before saying goodbye to Stow Maries Aerodrome.

On Thursday 14th September 2017 we held our AGM at the home of Stan and Joyce. After many years of being our hard working secretary, Joyce has decided to stand down and we could not let her go without rewarding her exemplary service with a small gift. We are fortunate in being able to welcome Viv Allmey to take up the post of being our new secretary. All other committee members remain in their original posts and Olive Davis has kindly agreed to join our committee. With increasing costs for external speakers we have agreed to increase member's annual subscriptions to £20-00. With no further business we closed our meeting.
