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On Thursday 28th September we met at the church for a talk by Rev. Michael Moon on his "Time in Australia." The Rev. Michael Moon has travelled all over the world and spent part of this time travelling around Australia taking photographs as he travelled along through many cities and exploring the outback.



Being a keen photographer we were treated to great examples of the natural plants grown in the area and iconic sights from this beautiful and vast country.

Back to the church again on Thursday 12th October as we were privileged to meet Mark who is a volunteer at HARP, Southend's homeless charity. Mark had retired from working in the financial sector and on his search for voluntary work had received many offers of treasurer posts but this was not what he was looking for. Eventually he was interested by a position at Harp in Southend which entailed preparing meals for their many customers.

HARP is based at the Bradbury Centre in York Road, a short walk from the high street. Many people have preconceived views on the homeless people on Britain's streets but there are many reasons as to how people have ended up in this position. In some cases it is due to marital break ups but it is also due to a loss of employment, sometimes drug or alcohol abuse, mental issues and so many more complex setbacks. It really could happen to anyone.

There are 19 residences that offer a total of 174 beds for rough sleepers to visit to get advice, rehabilitation and food from HARP. Since April this year the charity has staggeringly cooked 14,777 meals and handed out 862 night packs to rough sleepers. HARP gives its visitors tremendous support and does its best to help them change their lives for the better. Please spare a thought for the homeless, particularly during these cold wintry days and nights. The talk by Mark was a real insight into the problems our homeless face and how HARP helps them through this crisis in their lives.

Our church doors opened once again to welcome our members to a talk by Chris and Olive Davis on Thursday 26th October. The talk was a continuation of their Canadian Holiday evening which commenced in our previous club year. Many miles were covered on their holiday and many facets of the Canadian way of life were conveyed to us by Chris, accompanied by some most interesting video film.

We saw film of a baseball match and I'm sure we understand the complicated rules of this sport far more now than we did earlier. There was a log rolling contest between two contestants and the winner was the one who did not lose their balance and fall into the water.

A trip to the Canadian side of the Niagara Falls was shown and did you know that the Canadian boat is coloured red and boats travelling from the U.S.A. were coloured blue. Did I get that right Chris?

Chris and Olive did well to condense their talk on Canada to two evenings as this is a country of such contrasts.

On Thursday 9th November Ron Holloway spoke to us about his 32 years in the Police Force. He began his career in Basildon and eventually became a forensic science officer as a Detective Sergeant. In between those years he had also been stationed at Harlow and Epping and had enjoyed driving fast cars at times.

Ron brought in a few mementos including his helmet, various coat badges, a very heavy truncheon and handcuffs which nobody dared to try on despite Ron assuring us that he had the key. We were also treated to some photographs of a very young and dashing officer.

It was a very interesting and entertaining evening.

A Christmas Safety Notice

- 1. All members of the congregation planning to dash through the snow in a one horse open sleigh, going over the fields and laughing all the way are advised that a Risk Assessment will be required addressing the safety of an open sleigh for members of the public. This assessment must also consider whether it is appropriate to use only one horse for such a venture, particularly where there are multiple passengers. Please note that permission must also be obtained in writing from landowners before their fields may be entered.
- To avoid offending those not participating in celebrations, we would request that laughter is moderate only and not loud enough to be considered a noise nuisance.
- 3. Benches, stools and orthopaedic chairs are now available for collection by any shepherds planning or required to watch their flocks at night. While provision has also been made for remote monitoring of flocks by CCTV cameras from a centrally heated shepherd observation hut, all users of this facility are reminded that an emergency response plan must be submitted to account for known risks to the flocks.
- 4. The angel of the Lord is additionally reminded that, prior to shining his/her glory all around, s/he must confirm that all shepherds are wearing appropriate Personal Protective Equipment to account for the harmful effects of UVA, UVB and the overwhelming effects of Glory.
- 5. Following last year's well-publicised case, everyone is advised that Equal Opportunities legislation prohibits any comment with regard to the redness of any part of Mr R Reindeer. Further to this, exclusion of Mr R Reindeer from reindeer games will be considered discriminatory and disciplinary action will be taken against those found guilty of this offence.
- 6. While it is acknowledged that gift bearing is a common practice in various parts of the world, particularly the Orient, everyone is reminded that the bearing of gifts is subject to Hospitality Guidelines and all gifts must be registered. This applies regardless of the individual, even royal personages.
