

Lunchtime Concerts

Chelmsford has become a very good shopping centre, especially with the arrival of John Lewis, all the new shops in Bond Street and a large underground car park. On Fridays there is the added attraction of market stalls, including quality bread, fish and greengrocery. An additional perk which Michael and I enjoy is the lunchtime concert in the cathedral, with performances by choirs, instrumentalists and organists. Although the concert starts at 12.30 (and lasts about three-quarters of an hour) it's best to be there soon after midday to make sure of a seat; it is a very popular event. Before the start of the concert the Cathedral ladies offer sandwiches, cakes and hot drinks for sale which you can sit and enjoy before the performance. Weather Report 2017

Quite an odd year in many ways although in the end and, taken as a whole, it turned out to be pretty average. The first six months were much sunnier than usual, the last six months less so. It was actually the sunniest January since 2001, whereas September was the dullest since that same year. Overall we enjoyed 1,700 hours of sunshine (just slightly better than the average of 1685hrs). June was the best month, February the worst (65 hours).

'Hot' days are those where the thermometer reaches 25°C. The first hot day fell on 16 May, earlier than usual and the last on 29 August. Altogether there were 25 such days in the year (about average) with the hottest day on 18 June. (30°). Indeed for one whole week in June, the maximum daytime temperature exceeded 25° every day. The coldest day was 26 January when the thermometer stayed below freezing for 36 hours. There was a late frost on 27 April, an early frost on 6 November and 75mm of snow on 10 December. The maximum daily temperature for the year was 14.9° (average 14.5°).

Rainfall over the year at 569mm was below average (610mm). March, April, October and November were markedly dry (the 14mm recorded for October was the lowest figure so far recorded for that month). May and September were markedly wet. 33mm of rain fell over two days on 11 and 12 July.

Back to June for a moment; in 2016 there were just 131 hours of sun. In 2017 there were 222 hours. It doesn't make fixing holidays in UK an easy matter.


