From the Worship Team

Harvest 14th October

This will be a parade service and All Age Worship. The theme this year is The Sun, taken from the All We Can campaign in Malawi to provide solar panels so that land can be irrigated and become more productive, improving the life of those who have no means of supporting themselves. All We Can envelopes will be given out and there will be a special collecting box for them. We will be asking the children to bring dried and tinned goods to form the usual display. **On Saturday, 13th October**, please can you bring fruit, vegetables, flowers, branches with berries etc in sun colours [red, yellow, orange] to decorate the four window sills that will not be done by the organisations. I have asked Matthew Forsyth from All We Can to come back in the New Year.

News from the Circuit

We will not be seeing as much of Rev Brian Gameson in the future because he is only going to take preaching appointments in the area in the eastern part of the Circuit, closest to his home. This is because of the continued ill health of his wife Christine. Rev Hannah Bucke will be leaving the Circuit and the town centre ministry next July, to take up a post as Chaplain to an army medical corps. She feels that this is what she is being called to do. Rev Peter Moorhouse reported that there is a group of volunteers ready to take on the work she has been doing. Hannah is coming to lead worship at Hockley on the 23rd December, so put it in your diary now. I will also see if I can arrange another date for her to come to Hockley before she moves on.

Reporting Back

In May, there was a discussion at the end of the morning service about how Worship might develop to cater for all sections of our community. As a result, the Worship Team will be bringing proposals to the Leadership team and subsequently Church Council. The first is that on any fifth Sunday of the month [there are about four each year] there would be an earlier morning service which would be a full communion – just communion, with no sermon, [suggested time 9.30am]. Then in the afternoon, [suggested time about 4.30pm to 5:00pm] there would be a café style service, where we enjoy singing together and learn new songs. This may involve the band and it would probably be a "bring and share" type of afternoon tea. One of the other suggestions was that there are Bible "days" when a whole range of age related Bible - based activities are planned on the same theme and we can all share in these together. These would take time to organise and might only be once or twice a year. The proposals need to be approved and the details thrashed out so watch this space.

We are collecting dried flowers, such as statice, to use whenever one of us is away or on the fifth Sunday of the month. We shall endeavour to have flowers Sunday by Sunday but if on occasions there is nothing to see, I'm sure you will understand.


Dear Michael,

JOYCE RAE 6th October 1931 – 7th June 2018

The following eulogy was written by Stan and read by Simon, his son-in-law:

Joyce loved her family and as mother for her two sisters and four children of her own she dedicated herself to providing them with a happy and secure environment to enable them to enjoy the pleasures and to manage the challenges of life.

She placed great emphasis on politeness. 'Please' was an essential word for any request to receive a positive response and 'thank you' was expected before the deal was deemed to have been completed. Even friends did not escape her efforts to promote good manners. She also emphasised respect for authority, in particular standing whenever the National Anthem was played.

The family enjoyed sharing her sense of humour – she would react to situations that amused her with gleeful giggles. She also made use of verbal humour from time to time. On occasions she would bring the children breakfast in bed. If they asked why she was being so kind she would reply: 'Because it keeps everyone from under my feet for longer'.

As the children grew up and had partners, she liked to gather the whole family together for a social evening. This would begin with a meal, starting with a more than adequate first course, after which she would say apologetically: 'I'm afraid I haven't made much for dessert' and we would watch agog as item after item emerged from the fridge, revealing the efforts she had made to provide what she knew were the favourites of various members of the family.

Then came some party games to promote togetherness – she hated the company breaking into small groups. Two games emerged as regulars. One involved seeing who could complete the most Christmas cards in a given tine from the previously cut up pieces scattered at random on the floor; in the other game the object was to find the longest piece of wool from the pieces of varying length that had been hidden in obscure places. It could be days, or even weeks before some pieces would emerge from obscurity.

Whether by accident or design, the names of all the children began with the same letter as that of their mother and it was not unknown for Joyce to call the wrong name. As the only boy Jim was fairly safe and Joyce honoured him by describing him as her favourite son.

Much more could be said about Joyce and the family but she disliked long speeches. We can almost hear her saying: 'You went on a bit didn't you?'

Jan wrote recently: 'My sister Joy was a caring and kind person: I will always be grateful for what she did for my sisters and me. I will miss her terribly'. All the Js. including the favourite son, would endorse those words and Gina, joining the family later, would add that knowing Joyce transformed her life.

Many might think that so much family activity would be enough to keep her busy and give her a sense of fulfilment. Joyce thought otherwise. The care and concern that she showed for her family overflowed to her friends, acquaintances and the community. She loved helping others.

Her choice of employment as a doctor's receptionist illustrates this, and when she retired she wasted no time in finding voluntary work at two antenatal clinics as well as acting as secretary for the Hockley First Responders and helping with the production of the local talking newspaper for the visually impaired.

In her seventies she took part in two sponsored activities to raise funds for the RNIB, abseiling down the Council Offices in Southend and doing a 1000 feet aerial slide at South Weald Park. Only her arthritis, which made her ineligible, relieved the family of the challenge to attempt to dissuade her from doing a wing walk.

She was very keen on country dancing and was a talented caller at barn dances. She also enjoyed playing badminton though she would probably say that the best part was giving enjoyment to the other players as she entertained them with her somewhat unorthodox style of play.

A Sunday School teacher for several years whilst living in Romford, she remained active in church life when moving to Hockley, though in less conspicuous ways. She was an occasional organist until arthritic fingers became attracted to the wrong notes, and was secretary of the Thursday Social Club for several years, but she preferred background roles. Her favourite activity at social events was doing the washing up – she really enjoyed the fellowship of the kitchen.

Joyce held firm views on a wide range of issues, perhaps not always entirely supported by fact or logic as we would teasingly tell her. She accepted the teasing, possibly with a suitable quip in response.

She was traditional in her tastes and not a lover of change but she had recently taken a stride into the technological world of the 21st century and was communicating freely using texts and joining WhatsApp groups.

Several of the cards of condolence that we have received have included the same five words: 'She was a lovely lady'.

With that verdict we the family, for whom she cared so devotedly, entirely agree

Last walk of 2018


Our last walk this year is on **Saturday 13th October** and is a 5½ miles amble near **Matching.** We'll have lunch at The Fox in

you're interested or e-mail your preferred date to hockleymeths@live.co.uk.



HAVE YOU HAD A PROBLEM WITH THE AUTOMATIC DOORS? PLEASE READ THIS!



On a few occasions recently there have been problems with the automatic doors jamming or not opening properly. As this is almost invariably caused by incorrect locking or unlocking please follow these steps.

If, when you approach them, the doors don't open automatically, please don't immediately try to unlock them. There may already be somebody in the building and trying to unlock the doors will jam them

PLEASE RING THE BELLS AND WAIT A FEW MOMENTS BEFORE TRYING TO UNLOCK THE DOORS

If the doors are locked: 1; Turn the large key in each lock at the bottom of each door. Turn until you hear it unlock and keep turning until you can take the key out. 2; Open the doors by turning the small key in the keyhole to the top of the doors, then turn it back 3; Follow the instructions on the inside right of the doors.

Door Operation - To have the doors opening and closing automatically press the button on the control box on the inside right of the doors. To keep the doors locked (e.g. if you're alone in the building) press the button.

To lock up when for leaving press the 🔒 button and walk out

clear of the porch; wait for the doors to close, .

Turn the key in each lock at the bottom of each door. Turn until you hear it lock and keep turning until you can take the key out. The doors are now locked. No further action required! **Do NOT use the small key on leaving.**
