


Message from the Manse

A plaque by one of the radiators marks the gift of covers purchased by the children of Tom and Isabel Murphy, members for many years from 1964 onwards. Tom was our regular organist. The lights over the pulpit area were donated in 2014 by Maureen Blake in memory of her husband Peter. And a number of other features including the automatic side doors and the stage doors were paid for through the generous legacy of the late Bill Potter.

Fairtrade fortnight will soon be with us again, two weeks from 25 February to 10 March 2019 when we are asked to make an extra effort to include Fairtrade products in the weekly shopping basket. This year's campaign is centered particularly on cocoa farmers, so if it's chocolate you're after that's a good place to start. Hockley's Co-operative store boasts that it has a large range of Fairtrade products. As always Fairtrade's aim is to ensure that growers and farmers all receive a fair price for their supplies which in turn benefit their employees, their own families and the local community.

You may also have heard that Traidcraft suffered from a significant loss of revenue over the past 12 months. As a result the catalogue company has felt obliged to curtail its range of goods on offer to the public and limit its purchases to particular producer groups throughout the world, retaining its aim to set up fair and transparent ways of trading, powered by the sale of ethical products. At the same time Traidcraft Exchange has been established as a separate charity, relying on donations from the public to run life-changing development projects and campaigns. The two organizations are closely linked in order to transform trade for the better and build a fairer and more just world.

Reminiscing

Another Sunday School song that I vividly remember singing (many times). It features as number 277 in the Methodist Hymnal. The words were written in 1885 by William H Parker at the request of children in his Sunday School Class at Chelsea Street Baptist Church, Nottingham. The well known tune is by Frederick A Challinor.

Parker wrote no less than 15 children's hymns, mainly for Sunday School Anniversaries, and they were published in 1905 in a volume called "Sunday School Hymnary"

1. Tell me the stories of Jesus I love to hear; Things I would ask Him to tell me if He were here;

Scenes by the wayside, tales of the sea, Stories of Jesus, tell them to me.

2. First let me hear how the children stood round His knee,

And I shall fancy His blessing resting on me; Words full of kindness, deeds full of grace, All in the love light of Jesus' face.

- 3. Tell me, in accents of wonder, how rolled the sea, Tossing the boat in a tempest on Galilee; And how the Maker, ready and kind, Chided the billows, and hushed the wind.
- 4. Into the city I'd follow the children's band, Waving a branch of the palm tree high in my hand;

One of His heralds, yes, I would sing Loudest hosannas, "Jesus is King!"

5. Show me that scene in the garden, of bitter pain; Show me the cross where my Saviour for me was slain;

Sad ones or bright ones, so that they be Stories of Jesus—tell them to me.



WEATHER REPORT 2018

Once again I can share with you some of the features of last year's weather before they pass out of memory. Hopefully you can remember what a good summer it was. Sunshine figures were the highest at 1969 hours since 2003 and the second highest over the 32 years I've been keeping records of Hockley's weather. The average for those years is 1694 hours, so a welcome increase, due largely to an exceptionally sunny July (301 hours against an average 214 hrs). But each month, apart from March and April, was markedly sunnier than normal.

Sunnier the year may have been but overall it wasn't especially warmer. The 'Beast from the East' may have had something to do with it because February and March were very much colder than normal. There was a series of frosty mornings throughout February, culminating in 18cm of snow over four days at the end of the month and start of March. The last day of February was actually the coldest, with a night time temperature of -5°C rising during the day to -1°. The wind blew relentlessly from the east for 11 consecutive days. By 4 March the snow had gone and the thermometer climbed at last to 7°. The average daily maximum temperature for the year was 14.9°, against an average of 14.5°, the same as 2017. There were 29 'hot' days with a temperature of 25° or more, 31° being the highest, with the average July temperature being 25.7°, compared with an average of 23.0°.

There was more rain than usual - 698mm compared with the average 613mm. March, April and November were particularly wet, although August turned out to be the wettest month of the year thanks to 45mm of rain falling over 4 days from the 7th to the 10^{th.} Were you on holiday at the time? On the other hand both June and July were virtually rain-free, with just 2mm of rain falling in June, and July just as dry up to the 27th of the month when gardeners' prayers were finally answered and thunderstorms saved the day.



SUNDAY - THE LORD'S DAY


