Worship Team

It hardly seems a year since the last Annual Report, but then a lot has happened in that time.

The year started in March with the sad and unexpected death of Rev Steve Watts. Rev Michael Moon was appointed as our minister very quickly and chaired last year's AGM as one of his first meetings with us. Since then we have forged a new friendship with him and his wife Jane, met their children and grandchildren, enjoyed some memorable services together, including the Youth service weekend, when Church was transformed into a meditative paradise and the Teddy Bear service, when we shared our stories and love affairs with our favourite cuddly toys. We have enjoyed Michael's photographs, his stories and his sense of humour.

There has been an AAW service on the first Sunday of each month, three of which were shared with the Uniformed Organisations, who hunted eggs at the Palm Sunday Eggstravganza, decorated windows as well as built potato pyramids at Harvest, and donated very generously at the Toy and Gift service. Pam Smith, Sue Hockett, Rev Michael Moon, Bob Briant and Dani Mayo have presented active and interactive services, often accompanied by the band.

Rev Michael Moon has led a communion service on the fourth Sunday of each month, including a Pastoral Leaders Dedication and the Annual Covenant service.

The Cup of Song on the fifth Sunday has had a stop/ go history for a variety of reasons, but hopefully we will be more successful in 2020. The early morning communion has been discontinued, as it came immediately after Michael's planned one on the fourth Sunday and it was not well attended. However, we will continue to invite Emmanuel, (and possibly the URC) to join us and explore ways of growing together. The Christmas services were well attended. At the Toy and Gift Parade, the request for tokens to help the families displaced after fleeing violence and intimidation had an amazing response. The toys were also very gratefully received. The Carol Service was supported by the members of Sweyne Singers and *some visitors*. The Christingle had the

usual mix of families, teenagers, puppeteers *and visitors*. There was also a Christmas Day service, with about twenty people and *some visitors*. All our Christmas services were led by Rev Michael Moon and were much enjoyed. We benefitted from the publicity and use of the Facebook page.

Worship on the Move continues at Rupert Jarvis Court on alternate months, with a shared Carol Service on the first Sunday of December. Our months are January, March, May, July, September and November. The informal devotional part lasts for about 40 minutes and is followed by tea and cake. We have got to know the residents who attend and those members of Emmanuel who come. I am afraid that none of Hockley Methodists go when it is Emmanuel's turn to lead, except in December. Everybody is welcome at this informal gathering and if you would like a lift, then get in touch with me and I will do my best to arrange one.

The Worship Team became part of the Circuit invitations committee which after many meetings, led to a five year extension for the Superintendent Rev Peter Moorhouse and the appointment of Rev Calvin Samuel as the minister for Rayleigh, Rochford and Hockley (subject to Conference approval) from September 2020, for the next five years.

The Worship Team only has three members at the moment, all of whom have other responsibilities within the church, so a big thank you to everyone for your help and support throughout the year, especially on the big and busy occasions. I also want to express my thanks to Claire Thompson, our now ex church administrator, without whom I

would be running around in ever decreasing circles, trying to manage the incoming information, complete rotas, write prayers and present the notices. She has been a great support.

Treasurer

A copy of the Balance Sheet for the financial year ended 31st August 2019 follows this report. Details of receipts and payments in the various funds during that year can be found on papers pinned to a Notice Board in the Coffee Room and a personal copy can be made available on request.

All the funds showed acceptable balances but we need to bear in mind that this is only achieved thanks to William Potter's legacy. In the year to which this report relates it not only financed regular property payments, including cleaning and servicing, but also enabled us to carry out work required by the Quinquennial Report without the need for loans. A refurbished kitchen and an improved car park surface have been two of the benefits from this.

The legacy also makes possible the allocation of some of the money received from lettings to the Church Fund, rather than needing all of it for property matters as had previously been the case. Without this we would struggle to pay the circuit assessment. In the year to which this report relates, the amount received in the weekly offerings was just short of £12,500, to which some £2500 was added from Gift Aided income tax refunds. This left us short of the circuit assessment figure by just under £3000.

There are other payments that are made from the Church Fund which are largely financed from donations and fund raising activities. Grateful thanks is due to those who give so much of their time and energy to organise these social occasions which provide opportunities for enjoyable fellowship as well as boosting the bank balances. David Clarke continues to give me invaluable assistance without having an official title. I value his help more than I can say.

Communications

Publicising activities at Church as widely as possible is one of our principal tasks, and we've made use of The Link, the website, our Facebook pages, the Notices, Hockley Living and posters and handouts. We've started to make use of a couple of local Community Facebook pages and also a couple of free publicity websites and these seem to be widening our coverage. Claire Thompson, the Admin Assistant, has made good use of the main Facebook page, with consistent, regular and imaginative postings.

We're using bigger and bolder posters for our main events like Christmas and Easter - Billy came up with another stylish design for our Christmas poster – and continue to use the Church logo on all these.



Ron announced his retirement from editing the Link just before Christmas – he (and Shirley) have already been thanked for their contribution but it's worth recording it again here - they've been doing it for 10 years. Although nobody has come forward to take on the job, I had hoped to get together a small group to do the assembly, editing and copying so that no one person had to take on the whole role. Unfortunately, because of the Christmas break, and Muriel and I being on holiday, this hasn't happened at the time of writing, but I hope there'll be progress by 14th March.

We've had a couple of problems with the multi-media this year, notably with the sound system, but these have been resolved. Both laptops have been upgraded to Windows 10 and the hand-held radio microphone has had to be replaced.

After the trauma of introducing the arrangement to comply with the General Data protection Regulations, the system seems to be operating satisfactorily, largely thanks to Claire Thompson's efforts, although we aren't making best use of the database she has created. Just a reminder:

- You cannot keep info on Church members/friends/contacts on private e-mail accounts.
- Only send out e-mails to multiple addresses using the BCC facility.
- Don't let anybody else know your account passwords account passwords.
- GDPR requirements apply to paper as well as electronic data paper copies should not normally be kept at home and should be kept securely.

The Church website at <u>http://www.hockleyhawkwellmethodist.org.uk/</u> gives a lot of information about us and our activities, including non-Church groups and activities. It is visited regularly – according to Google there were 37 "visits" in October and 14 people asked for directions! The Church Calendar is one of its most useful features - all our own meetings and regular events are on that Calendar as well as special services and fundraising events and the activities of the hirers of the premises. It's important to keep it up to date and accurate so please let me have details of any event or changes to regular meetings.

We have two Facebook pages, one for the Church generally the other for Messy Church. In the longer term these will be amalgamated to avoid duplication. Both Facebook pages are used as a way of keeping people aware of activities at Church such as the Pancake and Fairtrade Coffee Mornings and these are repeated on the Messy Church page. Brightstars

Brightstars Toddler Group continues to flourish and it is encouraging to know that its reputation has seemed to spread not only around Hockley but to surrounding areas such as Ashingdon, Rochford, Rayleigh and even Southend. Obviously as some of the existing children have reached pre-school age some have left but they have easily been replaced by a healthy new intake.

Tea, Coffee, Biscuits and healthy snacks for the children is still provided which gives the adults a chance to take a break, chat with other parents, make new friends or just catch up with existing ones. It also helps in spreading around any news or gossip surrounding children's welfare, education or general wellbeing. In addition the sharing of all sorts of experiences and advice is always welcomed especially amongst new Mothers. The average number in attendance over the last 3 months is approximately 35 Adults and 40 Children. In fact our first day back after the Christmas break we saw 51 Adults and 57 Children in attendance.

We continue to receive positive feedback from parents who really enjoy coming along with many now bringing their second child. Grandparents too are coming along especially when looking after their grandchildren. When we are closed due to school holidays many voice 'Oh what are we going to do on a Monday now'

At Christmas the children and helpers each did a finger print which was cleverly turned into one Christmas Tree card by June. This was put on display in Hockley Library for all to see.

It is also encouraging to see more of the Mum's coming along to Messy Church, various Bazaars and many of the Church's activities along with their families, which is always nice to see.

Brightstars still helps in supplying Tea and Coffee for the Church and where possible makes small donations along the way, but we are still very much grateful to the Church for its generosity in offering up the Church and Activity Hall to host the group and for the support it gives.

We stress that the running of Brightstars is very much a team effort and our thanks go to: Gill, Ray, Lianne, Eleanor and Claire for all their continued valuable assistance in helping us.
