Rev Peter Moorhouse's Pastoral Letter

Lockdown Brain!



Hello from the Manse! This past Sunday as a church we said goodbye and thankyou to Revd Michael Moon and Jane. I'm sure they'll be missed. This means that in the short term as Superintendent I'm becoming your minister. In September Revd Calvin Samuel will become your minister but until then I will be here if you need me. So, things are getting better. I don't know about you but as we return, I'm suffering from lockdown brain.

This crisis has created a fair few new terms in our language. The one that I've been thinking about this week is lockdown Brain, the fact I can't process things the same way I did before lockdown. It seems that this week every meeting I have attended at least one person has asked me about a matter that was agreed before Lockdown and I can't remember it. Never having a so called "Poker Face" I'm sure those attending have spotted it. I've decided Lockdown Brian could be very useful to get me out of decisions or doing jobs I don't want to do. If I had been clever about this, I could have hidden the chocolate before lockdown and us as a family could have gone on an enforced diet! Somehow, I think one's capacity for remembering where Chocolate is beats Lockdown Brain.

Although the government now allows Churches to open both for private prayer and restricted acts of Worship, the Church Council has decided not to open the building for the time being. We felt that – having regard to the arrangements and restrictions that would be needed and the format that any service would have to take – it wouldn't, at the moment, be practical or safe to re-open the building.



But it is our wish to re-open as soon as it's safe to do so and the Church Leaders are continuing to look for the right time to do so in the light of changing government guidance. We are considering what's necessary to allow us to re-open safely including carrying out a thorough risk assessment that will deal with the many activities that take place on our premise and the purchasing all the sanitising, etc., materials that will be needed.

In the meantime, we continue to meet regularly on-line, pastoral and ministerial support is still available and we look forward to being able to meet and renew our activities as soon as possible.

[Those we know](#) who need our prayers – Kay as she continues to improve, Chris and Ron, Olive and Chris, Eunice and Sheila.

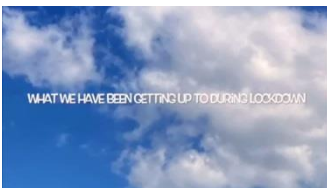
CHURCH VIDEOS

Our Zoom “meetings” are continuing for the time being.

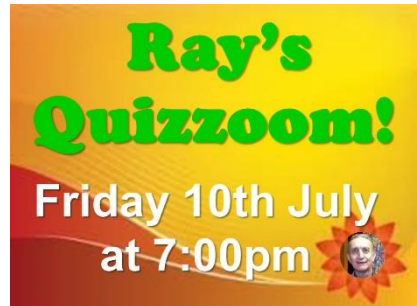
Why don't you join us?

It was Kay writing about the shops in Hockley that brought back this memory when she mentioned Mr Emery the butcher's shop that was just at the bottom of Woodlands Road.

My father-in-law and his brother had a butcher's shop in Leigh Broadway. I have photos of the meat hanging all around the outside of the shop. What Health and Safety would think now I do not know!



They also had a slaughterhouse behind the shop, and it was my father-in-law's job to deliver by horse and cart the meat ordered by other butcher's shops in the district. My father-in-law said that Mr Emery's was the last delivery and his horse would then know they were going home. I dread to think what the meat was like having left Leigh then having done a tour of the area stopping off at various butchers with the meat just laying in the back of a cart.

My father-in-law also said the lady that owned Bullwood Hall would during the year hold various competitions, one of them being the best dressed trade horse and cart, which one year my father-in-law won. It was a wooden biscuit barrel

You have all seen them - china on the inside and a wooden surround with a chrome lid, handle and shield. I still have it, plus a photo of the horse and cart .

It is so strange when someone mentions a name, the memories it can bring back.

Ros's Scandinavian Colourwork



As some of you know my mum was an avid crafter, she got such pleasure from creating imaginative gifts and cards.

Her love of creating led to a passion for collecting the materials she needed to make her wonderful projects and this of course meant she had a huge "collection" of resources including fabrics, yarns, card making materials, books, gadgets and sooooo much more!

My mum was an inspiration, and my sister and I spent many happy hours mulling over current and future projects.

Much of the collection was passed on to charity where children could benefit and use the materials, but my sister and I inherited the yarn and fabric stash.

I have lots of wool from my mum, she really liked to make crochet blankets and she really liked bright colours. Finding myself with plenty of time on my hands, this seemed like a good time to use some of it.

I started working on an online KAL (knitalong) hosted by a couple of Norwegian chaps. It was a chance to learn Scandinavian colourwork by making small patches, featuring traditional and modern designs. Each one takes about two hours to make and when you have enough, sew them together to make a cushion cover or with more designs make a blanket.

Making a blanket seemed like the perfect thing to do with all of the yarn. So far, I have made thirty five patches but hardly made a dent in the stash. It's good fun and keeps both brain and fingers engaged!

I think my mum would have approved.
