The building may be closed but we're still here! The latest on whether or not we can open!

Although the government now allows Churches to open both for private

prayer and restricted acts of Worship, the Church Council decided a while ago not to re-open the building. It was felt that – having regard to the arrangements and restrictions that would be needed and the format that any service would have to take – it wouldn't, at that time, be practical or safe to re-open the building.

But it is still our wish to re-open as soon as it's safe to do so and the Church Leaders are continuing to look

for the right time to reopen in the light of changing government guidance. So we are considering what's necessary to allow us to reopen safely. We have carried out a risk assessment and the conclusions from that will be reported to members and friends to canvas their views on whether or not we should open.

In the meantime, we continue to meet regularly on-line, pastoral and ministerial support is still available and we look forward to being able to meet and renew our activities as soon as possible. The Worship Team and some other Leaders are meeting regularly with Rev Calvin Samuel and representatives of Rochford and Rayleigh Methodist Churches to consider immediate and longer term plans for the three churches and a draft Circuit Preaching Plan has been drafted for the next quarter (starting September), although it remains to be seen whether that Plan will be implemented. We'll let you know!

A Thought for the Day

I like to read a 'Thought for the Day' from a book called 'Prayer for the Day'. This was the reading for 31 July:

"High Summer seems to be the invitation to dust off the tent in the attic and go camping. The tent is a stock item for those attending music festivals and for many people camping is the preferred of summer holiday. On this day in 1907, a very different sort of camp was held for the first time. Robert Baden-Powell set up the Brownsea Island Scout Camp at Poole Harbour in Dorset - and the scouting movement was born. He took a group of lads, some from the local community and others from top public schools, and showed them they could work together, encourage one another and

have fun. And it was out of this first 'experiment' that Baden-Powell wrote the definitive guidebook for the movement, called 'Scouting for Boys' which outlined life skills and personal values, while warning of the perils of drunkenness, gambling and swearing, not to mention the wiles of the opposite sex! These days Scouting embraces young people regardless of gender as well as background, and it's come a long way from the time when Baden=Powell's instructions were confined only to boys. The current Chief Scout is Bear Grylls who many people know from his exploits on TV. He was once asked what he loved about scouting, and his response was some words his Dad had said to him when he was young "Follow your dreams and look after your friends'.

In an age where we celebrate the cult of the individual and invariably prize personal attainment, it is encouraging to celebrate a movement that looks to develop the very best of the gifts that any of us possess - and find ways of using those gifts in the service of others. So today Lord, give us minds that are filled with possibilities, hearts that are open to every prompting of Your Spirit and lives that embrace one another in Your name."

In fact, he loved them so much that if it was an international contest then Norman would have won a record number of international caps.

Reminiscences - My First Date

So as not to be in the way I stood on the pavement by the front hedge. I thought surely my employer could have been more reasonable and warned the old lady that if she did not pay her rent and something off the arrears she would be evicted. As it was it came as a terrible shock to the old lady. On the other hand my employer would argue. As she has not paid any rent for over a year, what else could she expect.

While I was thinking that, I was surprised to see the young lady I had a date with walking up the road. "Hello" I said. "What are you doing round here?" "I've come to visit my nan" she said with an exquisite smile on her face. She was just about to ask me what I was doing when a look of horror spread over her face. "What are you doing to my nan?" she demanded and rushed into the house before I could answer.

About half an hour later she came out with her arms round her still weeping nan, she did not look at me, but as she walked past me she said "Never mind nan, you come home with me, we'll look after you." I was worried as the old lady had no bag with her so she did not even have a change of clothes. As I watched them walk up the road, that was the last I ever saw of my date.


