Rev. Calvin Samuel's Pastoral Letter

The season of Advent is about directing our attention to the One who is to come and preparing for that coming. The coming of the Lord is an invitation to penitence. It's one of the reasons that the colour for Advent is purple or violet, a colour that symbolises royalty, on the one

hand, and penitence, on the other. Advent speaks to both of those themes. If we are to be ready for the coming of the King we need to confront our own sinfulness in penitence.

Most of us no longer really think of ourselves as sinful. Sure, we know that we're far from perfect and that we're flawed human beings, but sinful and in need of forgiveness is probably not our default way of thinking of ourselves. There's always someone else worse than me.

I think previous generations were far more inclined to think of themselves as sinful. They carried a great deal of unnecessary and unhealthy guilt as a result. Therefore, in reaction to that we in our generation naturally resist the inclination to see ourselves as guilt–ridden sinners. That's in many ways a good thing.

Nonetheless, recognising our sinfulness in penitence is not an invitation to wallow in guilt. Rather, it is an invitation to acknowledge our sins and then to seek to be set free from them.

This Advent I wonder if that is not one of the best gifts we can be given this year. An invitation to have a good long and hard look at ourselves in the light of the coming King, to acknowledge our sins, and then to seek to be released from them so we can live changed lives.

Penitence is not just about being sorry for what we've done or failed to do in the past, it's also about how we want to change going forward. Making change, however, whether in ourselves or in our churches is always difficult.

Every year people make New Year's resolutions: we join a gym, take up running, start a new diet, begin learning a new skill, aim to create a new work life balance, plan to do our tax returns earlier, etc. By February, 80% of us have already failed in our New Year's resolutions and many start failing even earlier, by the second Friday after the new Year. So, January 15th 2021, is when the wheels begin to fall off most people's resolutions.

It's one of the reasons that public baptism after penitence was so important in the history of the Church. Baptism was an external and public indication that you had resolved to change your life. That sign, that symbolism, was one way to try to make the change stick.

Friends, I think we've got a lot of changes ahead. This pandemic has changed our world in ways that we still don't yet fully understand. As the people of God, I believe that God is calling us to change so that we are ready for whatever God wants to do next. but that change, as with all change, is going to be hard for us to adopt.

Advent is about preparing for what is to come so that we are ready. What action might we like to undertake this Advent as a sign that we are ready for change?

During Advent I'll be leading 4 weekly Reflections via Zoom beginning on Tuesday 1st December as we share some of our hopes, dreams and fears for the year to come. I do hope you'll be able to join me.

God our Father and our Mother, you spoke to the prophets of old of a Saviour who would bring peace. You helped them to spread the joyful message of his coming kingdom. Help us, as we prepare to celebrate his birth, to share with those around us the good news of your power and love. We ask this through Jesus Christ, the light who is coming into the world. **Amen.**

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TOY AND GIFT SERVICE

In lieu of the Toy and Gift Service this year, as bringing gifts to Church is not possible, we can



send gift vouchers to the women's refuge, now working under the title of 'Safe Steps' and/or make a donation to HARP.

Safe Steps has continued work throughout the pandemic, supporting those affected by domestic abuse, often over the phone or by video calls. They have seen a 77% increase in calls to their helpline.

This year they are having to adapt how they accept donations for Christmas and supermarket vouchers (for Tesco, Sainsburys or Coop) would be the best way of donating. Vouchers enable the women to purchase the essentials that they need and also gifts for their children this Christmas. A LINK TO THE PAST

I was going to continue Ian's epic cycle ride from Land's End to John O'Groats with a return to Issue 16 dated December 2011 to January 2012 but thanks to the generosity of June Waterfield I have been able to borrow further editions of The Link. This has enabled me to take a backward step, or should I say back pedal to the start of Ian's journey from Lands End which was in issue No. 14 August/ September 2011.

Lands End to John O'Groats Cycle Ride

Part One

As a keen cyclist one of my ambitions was to cycle from Land's End to John O'Groats known as "end to end." So in November 2010, I spent hours poring over maps and adapting the CTC Route to suit me, then I booked all my accommodation, a combination of bed and breakfast, and youth hostels.

So on Monday 16th May 2011, I travelled to Liverpool Street by train then cycled to Paddington, further than it looked on the map, resulting in me running along the pavement down the one- way street to the station but I made the train to Penzance ok.

I arrived at Penzance at 17.10 and after getting slightly lost in Penzance, I was soon on the right route to get to Land's End Youth Hostel. The route was fairly hilly and I missed the turning for the hostel, which is near St. Just, the sign was buried in the hedge but I made it in time to order an evening meal.

Tuesday 17th May : Lands End to Padstow : 75 miles

After a good breakfast I cycled the short distance to Lands End, the site was almost deserted as the amusements and entertainments do not open until 10.00 a.m. I took the obligatory photo of my bike by the sign and then set off for the first day's ride to Padstow, where I was staying in bed and breakfast.

Initially the weather was not too bad, the route however was very hilly and I had to stop to change gear so that I could use my smallest chain ring to ride up. I stopped at a nice village pub for lunch with friendly staff. My route went along the coast to Newlyn, then through Penzance, a short stretch on the A30, then across country to Cambourne and Redruth and then minor roads through Chacewater, Threemilestone, Shortlandsea and St Newlyn to Newquay. This route was pleasant with not too many hard climbs.

However after Newquay I rode along the coast on the B3776, this was extremely hilly and meant I spent a long time riding in very low gears. There were a lot of steep descents followed by a steep climb out of the valley. The weather began to deteriorate: it began to rain and was misty. I was going to arrive late at my digs and a hotel advertising cream teas was too tempting, so I stopped for some much needed refreshment and phoned up to let my landlady know I was going to be a little late.

After the break there was only three hard climbs and I was in the outskirts of Padstow and soon at the digs. After a quick shower and change of clothes I walked down to the harbour area and found a good pub for a dinner. The harbour area is a nice place to explore and I enjoyed the walk back to the digs.

It only took about fifteen minutes. I phoned Viv to let her know I had arrived safely and retired to bed at about 10.30 p.m.

Wednesday 18th May: Padstow to Okehampton: 65 miles

My journey to Okehampton was much easier than the first day. I went down to the harbour and caught the ferry to Rock and cycled along the pleasantly quiet B3314 to Delabole: then lanes towards Launceston, some of these had grass growing in the middle of the road and hardly any traffic on them.

In Launceston I stopped at a pub for lunch and then only had a short distance to travel to Okehampton, again it rained! I arrived fairly early at the digs and the proprietors provided tea and biscuits while we chatted., this was very welcome. It meant I could have a rest watching the TV before walking down into the town to get my evening meal, then return to phone home and relax in front of the TV before going to bed.

More of lan's epic adventure to follow.
