

Minister's Report

The year since our last General Church meeting has been a game of two halves...



Sabbatical

The first half of 2023 was in large part shaped by my sabbatical which meant I was away from the church for nearly 4 months in a combination of sabbatical and annual leave. Sabbatical cover was provided by Norman Hooks with the support of our church leaders and a circuit wide sabbatical support group. Work in HHMC of course continued in my absence not least with the continuation and development of Welcome Wednesdays. I'm hugely grateful for the energy and commitment which has made welcome Wednesdays such a pivotal point in our weekly rhythms.

Mission

The Church Council has been spending quite a bit of time thinking about mission, conscious that a church that's not growing is in the process of dying. In our case, not only do we need to grow larger we also need to grow younger, hence we've been reflecting on how we might more intentionally focus our mission outreach on families and children.

Part of our challenge is that we do not already have a critical mass of younger people as part of our worshipping congregation. So, it's a challenge to start from scratch. Our conviction is that we need to think of mission in terms of drawing people from wide circles of contact into an inner circle of friendship where and invitation to explore faith might have a better chance of being considered. So we might encounter families in Brightstars, which could lead to an invitation to Messy Church, which could maybe lead to an invitation to a JAM Club to All Age Worship and then perhaps eventually into an evangelism/discipleship course. However, with all these elements the question of human resources is an ongoing challenge.

Transitions

The last year has also seen some significant transitions. Stan has passed on the reins of Treasurer to Patrick and Carolyn has stepped back from her roles as Pastoral Secretary and Bookings Manager. We continue to wrestle with how we find sufficient volunteers to run the work of the church well. And the question of pastoral care is one of the issues we'll be spending time reflecting on together.

Next Steps

Many will know that my appointment in the circuit will end this summer after 4 years in the role. The Circuit Leadership Team is looking to appoint my successor from within the existing ministerial team by reshuffling ministerial responsibilities across the circuit. A plan has been made and we await the Superintendent contacting churches where ministerial oversight will change.

This means that this will be my final General Church meeting in Hockley and Hawkwell. It has been a privilege to serve alongside you.

Worship Team

Writing this report is always an interesting exercise, as we are forced to look back over the last twelve months. This usually involves looking at last year's report to see where we finished!!



We have continued with a steady pattern of services. The first Sunday in the month is usually All Age Worship and led by our own minister, Calvin and the stewards usually plan this together. The third Sunday is generally a Communion service and the second or fourth service is a service led by Anne who is our Worship Leader. That means once a month the Circuit designates a local preacher or one of the other ministers to lead our worship.

The quarterly plan is discussed with Calvin and the stewards from Rayleigh and Rochford churches so that important anniversaries and events can be catered for. Occasionally, we invite specific preachers or ministers to lead a particular service.

Three times a year there are Parade services which cover the main annual festivals – Harvest, Christmas and Easter. We try to share the planning with the leaders of the Uniformed Organisations but finding a suitable date when everyone is free can be tricky. There are also problems with the Leaders being available to supervise the children on the day.

These services, with their particular focus, result in money being sent to All We Can for projects in the developing world, food to HARP to support the homeless in Southend and gifts to Safe Steps for those affected by domestic violence.

From March to July 2023 Rev Calvin Sammuel was on sabbatical. Rev Norman Hooks was assigned to help Rochford, Rayleigh and Hockley during this period, but only for two days a week and two services a month between the three churches, When Calvin took up a further role in the Connexion, after his sabbatical, this continued. Norman chaired some of the Church Council meetings and was/is a regular visitor to Welcome Wednesdays.

At the end of 2023, Calvin informed the Church Council that he was seeking an appointment abroad and that the Connexion had given him permission to do so. He will be standing down from stationing from August 2024. However, his appointment does not officially end until 2025 so there will be twelve months before a

new minister can be appointed to our section through the usual procedures, if one is available and a suitable match can be found.

The Circuit will rearrange the existing ministers to cover Calvin's three churches, in the meantime but as yet we do not know who this will be.

Anne, Gill and Muriel are the three stewards who share in all of the planning, making the rotas and setting the church up each week. Sandra is the communion steward, Peter and John the organist/pianist and June, George and Sandra door stewards. Nicola emails the notices and Ray distributes the paper copies to those who do not use the internet, Thanks go to all of these for the work they do in making the wheels turn smoothly.

We can always accommodate additional volunteers for reading on a Sunday, as Communion stewards and as door stewards so speak to Gill, Anne or Muriel if you think you can add your name to the rota and need more information on what is involved.

Thank you all for your constant support throughout the year.

Treasurer's Report 2022-2023

The willingness of members and friends to donate to the Church by a monthly Standing Order enables the Treasurer to know that some £10,000 will be received in the course of the year.



However, this is little more than half of the sum needed for the Circuit Assessment which is the first claim on our income so this report recognises the value and importance of money raised from letting the Church Hall, and records appreciation and thanks to those who devote time and energy to such activities.

A further source of income is the annual Gift Day. Down a little this year at just under £900. It was augmented by proceeds from outside Amos Estates, which raised over £299, and a generous donation of £1,000 from Brightstars, which created a sum well in excess of the amount needed to purchase and install a defibrillator to benefit the local community.

In this, my last report, I want to thank the Church for the privilege of being their Treasurer for a number of years and, in particular, to David for examining the monthly Bank Statements and banking the money and to Nicola for her ready willingness to assist me in any way.

I also want to warmly welcome my successor, Patrick, he is well versed in the ways and means of Methodist finance and experience in our own Circuit. The future of the finances is in safe hands.

Treasurer's Report 2023-2024

After many years of exceptional service Stan Rae resigned as Treasurer effective from 31st August 2023. I was then appointed by the Church Council. Before and after my appointment I had many discussions with Stan. I would like to thank him for all the help and information he has given to me. Stan still has a superb memory and in depth knowledge and I have very much appreciated and enjoyed our conversations and I value what I have learnt from him.

We now have access to on-line banking which has helped considerably with keeping up to date and with prompt payment of bills.

Identified by Stan in his report for last year was the key factor of standing orders, and I am pleased to be able to report that the amount has increased from £750 per month to £835 per month.

A sum of approximately £1,000 has been raised from various events so far, including £489.46 from the Christmas Bazaar. Thanks to those who organised this and other fund-raising events.

I have noticed that there has been an increase in the amount which the Church is required to pay to the Circuit for the Circuit Assessment, the current amount being £5,006 per quarter. Despite the generosity of those paying by standing order, this means that the Church made a loss of £1981 in the first quarter. With so many pressures on our income as a result of inflation it is difficult to see how this loss can be reduced. Gift Aid will help. If you have not Gift Aided your regular offerings, please consider whether you can do so. Please ask Stan for the appropriate form.

I would also like to thank Nicola, for the part she has played in assisting Stan, David Clarke for his kindness and for continuing to collect and pay in offerings and other monies and Ros Hayman and Anne Sains for their assistance with paying out monies for bills. Finally, I would like to thank the Auditor, Chris Davis, for his work on last year's accounts, as well as for agreeing to continue as Auditor.

A copy of the balance sheet for the year ended 31st August 2023 follows this report and a full copy of the Accounts is on the coffee room display board.

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Property

In the third month of the 2022-2023 Church Year the Church underwent a Quinquennial Review, the result was the best received for many years but there was still the challenging words detailing the work that was essential in the next 12 months. It is a tribute to the Finance and Property Committee that the work was completed one



month less than the target, partly due to Colin's willingness to use his skills and Nicola's persistence with reluctant tradesmen, in particular the electrical system has been examined and improved.

A major incident occurred in July 2023 when a car, not for the first time, grazed the side wall of the vehicle entrance, rendering it irreparable. Estimates to replace it have not been easy to obtain but perseverance has prevailed and there are two now under consideration. Work may have at least stared by the time this report is read.

The Finance and Property Committee has got just 5 members. I want to thank all of them for their interest, commitment and concern.

Mission Planning

Don't be bamboozled by the title! This just means how we are connecting and interacting with the wider community both here in Hockley, in the country and the world, spreading the news of God's love for everyone and growing his kingdom.



At the Annual Church Meeting in 2023, it was agreed that the Warm Spaces project had been meaningful for the Church family, even if there had not been a take up for those needing to keep warm. It was agreed that it should begin again in September as a regular event. In conjunction with other churches in the Churches Together group, we kept to a Wednesday and Welcome Wednesday was born!! It has been advertised throughout the area along with Drop In Mondays (Emmanuel) and Feelgood Friday at Bramerton Road.

As a result of the Visioning Day which took place last July, contacts have been developed with the Primary Care Network. They have run two events here, the second of which required the use of both the church and the hall and brought quite a number of people through. The church provided refreshments and that gave us the opportunity to chat with a wide range of people, many of whom had never been inside our buildings and were surprised at how extensive they were!

Contact was also made at the Visioning Day with Trustlinks, a mental health charity but did not progress because of a change of personnel there. Later, Rachel was invited to Welcome Wednesday, where there was some lengthy discussion about the work of the charity and how we might co-operate.

On a regular basis we support All We Can as a Partner Church and are committed to raising £600 a year. The gifts at Harvest and Christmas have usually covered this and there are sometimes other opportunities in the year to donate.

We have been longtime supporters of HARP the Southend charity for the homeless, sending food mainly at Harvest, but there is also a box in church for donations. Since the pandemic, there has been no winter night shelter. At Christmas, gifts are donated at the Toy and Gift service for Harp, usually toiletries.

The Safe Steps domestic violence charity in Southend is also the recipient of the donations at the Toys and Gift service and has been for a number of years now.

Our events are regularly posted on social media in an effort to raise our profile within the local community and create contacts with local families.

The Church Council has begun to explore possibilities for increasing our work among families and children, conscious that there is a missing generation in our church family. Our challenge, as always, is working out how such additional work might be resourced given that we have limited volunteers.

Eco Church

The Methodist has a target of becoming a net zero emissions church by 2030. The Eco Church awards are a way of making progress towards this goal.



Last year we made some excellent progress and became a Bronze Award Eco Church. As part of this, some work was done with the Beavers to help improve wildlife friendly plants in the car park garden border and they also installed a bug hotel. We completed a full survey of our land, buildings, worship activity and community engagement.

The Church Council has agreed that we should continue with our work and aim to achieve a silver award.

We need to complete a new survey to identify the specific areas we need to focus on to achieve this.

Thanks to all members of the congregation for supporting this work during the year. I hope we can continue our work and achieve the silver award.

Below are just a few examples of the questions we will need to answer:

- Our church organises events providing an opportunity for local people to engage with local leaders on local environmental issues (e.g. local MPs, AMs or council leaders);
- Our church (either alone or as part of a local network) organises environmental awareness-raising events (e.g. film evenings, Fairtrade events etc.);
- Our church is involved with local conservation work (eg. at an A Rocha UK Partner in Action or RSPB/Wildlife Trusts nature reserve);
- At least some of our church members (either alone or as part of a local network) have organised and/or participated in a community clean-up project (e.g. local litter-pick);
- Our church actively promotes Eco Church to other local churches;
- Our church has committed to pray for a specific overseas environmental project;
- Our church participates in campaigns concerning national environmental issues:
- Our church keeps the congregation informed about the impact of climate change and environmental degradation on Christian communities elsewhere in the world; and
- Our church financially supports an environmental charity.

<u>Defibrillator Project</u>

After several months of research, grant applications and fund raising the church has been able to install a Defibrillator on the front of the building.

Thanks to all involved in the fundraising day outside Amos Estate Agents and particularly to June Parkhurst for initiating contact to make this happen.



We had a generous donation from Brightstars and our Gift Day donations for this year also went into the fund.

We selected London Hearts as the provider and were able to apply for matched funding from the government which enabled us to purchase a cabinet and pay for an electrician to install it.



The defibrillator is fully automatic, and although training for its use is not essential Adam Markam will bring a defibrillator and Resusci Annie to Welcome Wednesday on 27th March to show how it works. There is video training and information available from London Hearts which we can access.

The defibrillator has been registered with 'The Circuit' which is the national database, used by the ambulance service.

For summer term we have booked a visit from Guide Dogs when we are at Guidewoods and we are very much looking forward to meeting Declan.


