Stewards' Report

(including Pastoral Committee, Outreach and Mission Planning)

Since the last Annual Church Meeting, the main events have been The Party on the Green, saying goodbye to Rev Calvin Samuel and hello to Rev Agnes Sam and her family.



The Party on the Green for Pentecost was the big event of the summer, planned by the Churches Together, led by the ministers of Hawkwell Baptist and Parish Churches, Hockley Community Church URC and Hockley Methodists. Us Methodists were responsible for the children's activity tent as well as being there to help with the set up and clear up. We found and booked the face painter. The Gospel Choir, which uses our church for weekly meetings also took part. Prior to the event there were sessions making headbands and packing the paper carrier bags for the day, where volunteers from the involved churches worked together.

The most time- consuming part of the planning was filling in the form required by the local authority to show that it would be a safe event and comply with all necessary regulations. For this the Churches Together could draw on the experience of Hawkwell Parish Church and their Carols on the Green event but it was a frustrating process. However, that groundwork will stand us in good stead for this year.

This was an open -air event, the sun shone and was regarded as a big success. It was very well attended and many stayed on for the picnic. It was estimated about 200 people were there, all of whom are looking forward to more of the same. As a result, it will be repeated this year, planning is already underway and this is now part of our Mission Planning.

May to July was focused on farewells for Calvin both here and in the Circuit with a final one at Rayleigh in July. He had a very packed schedule in the month or two prior to leaving. He led worship for our Church Anniversary and Gift Day. His last Church service was on the 14th July when we took the opportunity to thank him for his ministry and to wish him well. A monetary gift of £250 was presented to him as well as a framed picture of all his friends at Hockley. On the 21st July there was an inspirational and much enjoyed section

service at Rayleigh Methodist when each of our churches thanked him once more.

Calvin had one more important service to lead on Monday, 22nd July which was the funeral of Glynis Teare who had been a church steward at our church in the past.

In August we invited Agnes to a Welcome Wednesday and our journey with her began, following the pattern of services set by Calvin. There was a reunion style service in September, when we invited all our members and friends both past and present to join us. The Harvest Festival came next with a Parade when food donated went to HARP and then Remembrance Sunday in November when we also lost Shirley James, a long-standing member and Hockley activist.

In December, the Toy and Gift service was a Parade with the donated gifts (which completely filled a car both the boot and inside!) going to the Safe Steps Southend domestic violence charity. There was great joy when the Christingle service saw numbers return to something like pre-covid levels. There was a retiring collection for Little Havens which raised £120. Christmas Day was a joint service with the Community Church URC but was not well attended. £270 was donated in lieu of sending each other Christmas cards and this will be used to purchase extraordinary gifts through All We Can. Thank you for your generosity.

In January, Methodists share in the Covenant service which is a reminder of the commitments we take on as members and friends. February saw a united service at Great Wakering which was well attended. United services are now a regular part of our worship routine as there is a shortage of local preachers. Each church has to have one service a

month when a Worship leader, (in our case this is Anne) takes the service or the stewards have to organise an alternative. Once, during the last twelve months we used a service from a Methodist Church in Marlowe which was on Youtube.

Special thanks must go to Peter as our only organist since John went to work in Egypt and to Anne who does a service every month for us filling in when no preachers are available. Gill checks on supplies for services like Palm Sunday, Easter Day, Mothering Sunday and Christingle. All of these are much appreciated.

The stewards, who are all Pastoral visitors, have taken on the role that Carolyn relinquished over twelve months ago. Kay had passed away and subsequently Vivien Allmey told us that she was moving to Eastwood so we are two pastoral visitors short. The groups were reorganised so that no-one was left out, and split between the three of us, but it would help if someone could take on the secretarial role of calling meetings twice a year, co-ordinating with Nicola in keeping the list of the members and friends list accurate and letting Agnes know of any needs or where a visit is required.

We have been pleased to welcome into our Sunday congregation Gill and Pam. Ann Baucutt and Valerie Wallace have agreed to help out with the Sunday refreshments and Adam has agreed to be a door steward for All Age Worship. Keith fills in when needed and when he can. There have been a couple of extra volunteers for readers too so thank you to all for your support.

Welcome Wednesday has continued each week except for during August, when the Day Centre used our premises three days a week for three weeks whilst a new kitchen was installed in their own building. A change to Wednesday afternoons in September didn't suit the majority of Wednesday friends so from early this year, we have reverted to meeting on Wednesday morning from 10-12 noon. Welcome Wednesdays provide a warm welcome for chat, tea or coffee, a biscuit and possibly cake! It is a good talking shop!

Thanks must go to all those who volunteer for jobs to keep everything running as smoothy as possible and are willing to stand in at a moment's notice.

We look forward to our relationship with Agnes growing ever deeper and to her helping us to develop our role in our community.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>

Once again, I would like to express my thanks to Stan Rae for his continued support. It was sad news that Stan was admitted to hospital and, as at the time of writing of this report, that



is where he is now. We all pray for his speedy recovery.

I am pleased to be able to report that standing orders from our regular givers have once again increased, from £835 per month at the time of my last report to £915 per month. Thank you to all the regular givers.

Thank you to all those who helped to make the Christmas Bazaar such a success. The amount raised was £600.50, a splendid effort by all those who organised this fund-raising event.

Offerings are now more regularly part of our Sunday Service. Over £1000 has been received from these offerings since the 1st September 2024. I would encourage this to continue. We are also trying to get up and running a Wi Fi card machine so that, in this increasingly cash-less society, offerings can be made by debit or credit card. However, this is proving more difficult than we first thought and is still a work in progress.

There has been a small reduction in our Circuit Assessment, only £400 per year, but every little helps!

The Church made a loss £4366 in the year ended 31st August 2024. Apart from the Circuit Assessment, nearly all of our costs are rising with inflation and I am therefore anticipating a loss for the year ended 31st August 2025, although a smaller loss than in the previous year.

Gift Aid will help. If you have not Gift Aided your regular offerings, please consider whether you can do so. If you let me know that you wish to gift aid, I will provide you with the appropriate form. If you would like to make a monthly payment by standing order please let me know and I will

provide you with the necessary bank details. Please either speak to me next time you see me or email me at hmethstreasurer@gmail.com.

I would like to thank Nicola, for the part she has played in assisting me and Stan, David Clarke for continuing to collect and pay in offerings and other monies, and Ros Hayman and Anne Sains for their assistance with paying out monies for bills. Finally, I would like to thank the Auditor, Chris Davis, for his work on last year's accounts, as well as for agreeing to continue as Auditor.

Property

In January 2024 a defibrillator was installed at the front of the Church on the outside of the building for use by both the local community and Church users. A grant was obtained from London Hearts and the shortfall was raised via fundraising by the Church. We'd like to thank everybody involved



with obtaining the grant, fundraising for the shortfall and installation of the defibrillator which is an asset for our congregation, hirers and the local community.

The regular servicing of items has been carried out as usual and we instructed our fire extinguisher servicer, Barry, to carry out a fire risk assessment in July 2024 which detailed some recommendations to make the building safer. These items are currently being investigated by the committee.

The Church wall was finally repaired in July 2024 but shortly after, was struck by a vehicle again! After numerous discussions regarding protection to the wall and buttress, it was decided to repair both and install metal on both to protect the wall and building if any vehicles do strike again. The builder has been instructed and is waiting for a fair weather day to carry out the works.

The Finance & Property Committee currently has 5 members and we'd like to thank them all for their hard work and commitment.

The keyholder agreements were also reviewed and re-issued to all regular hirers and all updated information recorded on a spreadsheet enabling us to manage the lettings more effectively and forecast future income more easily. Thank you to everybody involved in the above process.


Now the updated arrangements are in place, the management of regular and one-off hirers is being maintained by Nicola with the support of Church Trustees.

It has been another busy year for our club with visits to many local places of interest.


Sadly, we lost Shirley James last year and we will miss her greatly as she had

We try to promote the Church and its activities in the local community via posters, our website and Facebook with Nicola maintaining our presence on the last of these by regular postings, not only of our own activities but also items from the Methodist Church of GB and other websites. We continue to be grateful for Billy's contribution to our posters, leaflets, etc. Some time ago Church Council agreed that all Church publicity material and public documents should include Billy's double H motif so that it becomes a recognisable logo for the Church and we've continued that.

Billy and I run the Digital Distance Design Service as he can be anywhere when we need a poster or image – I send the details and the artwork arrives over the ether for editing and printing. We replace the large poster on the roadside Notice Board a couple of times each year.
