Rev. Calvin Samuel's Pastoral Letter

A year ago, I wrote my first pastoral letter to you at the beginning of September. None of us, of course, had any idea that the past year would be so dominated by the pandemic and that we would still be living with the various restrictions that we have voluntarily undertaken in order to keep ourselves and others safe.



For us Methodists, September, of course, marks the beginning of the new Connexional year and new beginnings for many ministerial colleagues. This week welcome into our Circuit here in Southend and Leigh a new ministerial colleague, the Revd Zena Smith. Zena comes to us from the Cumbria District and succeeds the Revd Chris Sandy. She will be working in the Castle Point Section of our Circuit. Please pray for Zena as she makes her home in the Benfleet Manse.

Much of what I had to say to you at the beginning of the last connexional year still stands.

One of the things that the pandemic and Lockdown have begun to teach us is how to live with uncertainty and ongoing change. In truth, the pandemic has not increased uncertainty. Rather, it's exposed how little we actually control, despite our best efforts to the contrary. This pandemic is a lesson in learning to live in the now, because the future is as unpredictable as it has ever been.

One of the ways we have learned to deal with uncertainty is to develop greater capacity for change. 18 months ago, many of us had barely heard of Zoom. Now it is an everyday part of our lives, and some Zoom meetings are likely to replace face to face meetings in the long term. We've experimented with online services, and found creative ways to do Messy Church, All Age Worship, and Friday Club despite the restrictions. We've developed capacity for change because we've had to.

My prayer is that we will continue to hold on to that capacity for new approaches.

Over the last few months, the Church Council has been giving some thought to mission planning to begin to explore how we might more effectively reach out to those who are part of our community networks. In the coming year our aim is to begin to flesh out and implement a mission plan that's appropriate for our congregating and relevant to our community. Please pray for the guiding of God's Spirit for that work to engage with new people.

The prayer below is the one is used in y pastoral letter a year ago. It feels appropriate to revisit it as we stand on the cusp of a new connexional year.

God of beginnings and endings, Creator of Time and Space: in your Wisdom, give us clarity of insight to discern and to focus on those things that matter most. Enable by your Spirit us to elevate the important above the immediate and to expend our energies on building a future better than our past. **Amen.**


Station Approach



Extraordinary Circuit Meeting on Zoom

Stan, Ros and I attended an Extraordinary Circuit Meeting on Zoom on 18th August and I would like to share some of the information and explanations that came our way. This is a paraphrasing of part of the draft minutes of the meeting:

Recently decisions outside the control of the Circuit, in the wider Church, have had a considerable and unexpected impact on our pastoral situation from September 2021. In addition, Covid has impacted finances hard at church and circuit level. As a result, the ability of the Circuit to plan was seriously impaired until the full facts surfaced. Following a similar Connexional impact in 2020 we knew we were in no position to employ additional ministers and, having had success with both Local Pastor and Pastor/Preacher (P/P) appointments we decided the way forward was to seek to appoint another P/P.

Subsequently, due to lockdowns, many churches lost a lot of income and it was decided we could not afford to employ even a P/P.

The Circuit Leadership Team (CLT) continued to seek ways out of the situation but only had one month to revise Pastoral oversight for September and the necessary actions have had to be taken immediately. We are effectively 2 members of staff under our preferred complement and the extra pastoral load falls on ministerial staff, supernumeraries and their families. For example the Superintendent currently has five churches plus the superintendency – a situation which fails to give the support the churches and the Superintendent deserve.

The lack of staff impacts not only pastorally, but also on the Plan – we are down 24 Sunday main service preaching appointments. The Plan is also impacted by the fact that several Local Preachers have passed on, moved away, retired or candidated for ministry giving a loss of 33 Sunday Morning appointments per quarter since the Plan of October 2015. Ministers want to be in the main church services more, but this can only be done if people work with the Ministers about the timing of their main service - some churches have already done this, some feel they can't. However, we must have some movement in service times or there will be more Local Arrangements per quarter Churches that move their main service will find

less LAs and a radical move away from Sunday morning could unlock considerable opportunities. Circuit Meeting members and churches were encouraged to consider possible changes to timings of services

Here at Hockley we have already made changes to the service time and legacies as well as your consistent giving during lockdown have largely cushioned us from the financial effects of the pandemic. In the discussions about how to deal with the situation, it is inevitable that closing some

churches might be one course of action, although this was not desired by anyone. However, as one of the small churches, we would be vulnerable, if membership alone was the criteria. This is not even on the agenda at present but is something you should all be aware of and bear in mind when ministers are unavailable, or difficult to contact and your prayers are needed, especially for Rev Peter Moorhouse, who has five churches at the moment and with whom the responsibility rests, when difficult decisions have to be made.

We hope to return to the church hall in September when we will be joined by some new members. We will still be following strict guidelines from Guiding around Covid to keep everyone as safe as possible. The girls will embark on new challenges following the programme working towards a whole new set of badges. There will be games, art and craft as well as lots of fun as we settle into our new home.

A 'Thank You' from June Waterfield

I would like to say a big 'Thank You' to everyone who has kept the Church running over the last 18 months – with Links, Notices and phone calls it has helped me to keep in touch with people.

When I lost Arthur in 2020 everything he and I talked about came to a stop, we both had planned to carry on, but the Church was closed, also the Library, the Day Centre and the Scrabble Club. I kept his carer on, Fay, to

keep me sane as for 2 years I had only been out when he had carers with him.

So I've been going down memory lane. When we moved house here in 1955 I transferred my membership from Goodmayes Church, Ilford to Hockley. Goodmayes Church was a very large church – 4 or 5 halls, and a balcony round the Church. Any large Circuit events were held in that Church and it was often full. I got involved in Hockley when Rikki was 3 in 1969, joining Beginners Sunday School; there were also Primary, Junior and Seniors. With Kay Deedman, Brenda Cuthbert, Shirley Neale and Christine Gameson in Beginners Rikki made lifetime friends with Simon Whittock.

When I decided to give up Sunday School in the 1980s, Malcolm Clark asked me to go into the vestry and Don Walker took me under his wing. I remember all the parties in the 1970s. For Harvest and Christmas you had to put your name down early as the Hall only held100.

There were Anne and Dennis White, Isobel and Tom Murphy (Father Christmas) (*I remember Tom as Father Christmas! Ed.*) and Don and Kath Walker arranging everything. It seems with Kath passing away with Covid that she was the last of the group and is missed.

I hope that the Zoom goes on a little longer – I'm not sure when I'll be back with you.

The Climate Sunday initiative



Climate Sunday is a Churches Together initiative calling on all local churches across Great Britain & Ireland to hold a climate-focused service on any Sunday before COP26 (November 2021).

So far over 1,000 churches have joined in; could Hockley and Hawkwell Methodist Church add its voice this year by holding a climate-focused service to explore the theological and scientific basis of creation, care and action on climate, to pray, and to commit to action?

The vision is to leave a lasting legacy of thousands of churches better equipped to address this critical issue as part of their discipleship and mission and to make a significant contribution to civil society efforts to secure adequate national and international action at COP26.

More than 1,600 churches have held a Climate Sunday service, a testament to churches' desire to show love for God and neighbour by caring for creation and acting on climate change.

On Sunday 5 September 2021, at 4:00pm churches from across Britain and Ireland will come together online and in Glasgow Cathedral to celebrate, challenge and commit ahead of COP26.

The service will be broadcast live from Glasgow Cathedral - at the heart of the city where the UN climate talks will take place in November - with contributions from Christians around the nations.
